## BRIEF HISTORY

Washington Junior College was authorized officially for operation as a Two year college by the State Department of Public Instruction, Tallahu sie. Florida, and the Escambia County School Board, September 6, 1949. At that time, the recollege years were designed to include courses for grades thirteen and fourteen.
